According to the Chinese Zodiac, the Year of 2012 is the **Year of the Dragon**, which begins on January 23, 2012 and ends on February 9, 2013. The Dragon is the fifth sign of the Chinese Zodiac, which consists of 12 Animal signs.



The Dragon is a creature of myth and legend. In ancient China, the celestial Dragon represents an emperor and power. Today, it is the ultimate auspicious symbol signifying success and happiness. May the celestial Dragon bring great good luck to everyone.

In Sung Dynasty (a Chinese imperial dynasty lasting from AD 960 - 1279) texts, the dragon is described as having the head of an ox, muzzle of a donkey, eyes of a shrimp, horns of a deer, body of a serpent covered with fish scales, and feet of a phoenix. The dragon usually clutches a pearl symbolic of its super-natural powers. Invariably accompanied by thunder and rain, dragons move like lightning and whirlwinds - - all powerful yet totally unpredictable.

People born in the **Year of the Dragon** share certain characteristics: Innovative, enterprising, self-assured, brave, passionate, conceited, and quick-tempered.

Trip to Zealong 's Gordonton Tea Estate

Nov 27th 2011



10 minutes north of Hamilton is the Zealong Tea Estate the only tea plantation in NZ. Pure oolong tea is organically grown here. It is hand-picked and spray free. Started by Mr Chen and his son Vincent who imported 1500 tea seedlings from Taiwan in 1996 but because of the strict NZ quarantine conditions only 130 plants survived. From these plants with careful propagation, has grown thousands of plants which today are planted over 50 hectares.



On the 27th November a full bus of NZCA members took a trip to the Zealong Tea Plantation and experienced a traditional tea ceremony of their oolong tea. We first had a tour through their gardens which had large bronze sculptures depicting the tea making process and various large ornamental teapots lined the path to the tea house. We were shown tea bushes of which we were able to pick a sample of tea leaves – best tea comes from the tips of the bushes of which you only pick the top 3 leaves. We were then ushered

into the Camellia Tea House where we were shown a video of the estate and the way tea was processed before enjoying the tea tasting ceremony. We tasted 3 types of oolong tea.



The first was Pure which is unroasted leaves, Aromatic where the leaves are briefly roasted, and Dark where the leaves are roasted longer. My pick was the Aromatic tea which had a mild and pleasant taste. After enjoying the surrounds of the estate we drove to Hamilton where we stopped for lunch.



The afternoon we spent at the garden of Temple View and then on to the Hamilton gardens before returning to Auckland. Our very obliging bus driver took us through Pokeno where we stopped for an ice cream and many of us also managed to buy some of the famous Pokeno sausages - the butcher opening up the shop especially for our group!! All in all it was a lovely days outing and our thanks go to Estella Lee who organised it for us.

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Lowering Blood Pressure

CHINESE REFUGEES ARRIVAL AT AUCKLAND

MUCH HARDSHIP ENDURED

(By Telegraph—Press Association.)

AUCKLAND, September 4, The first group of Chinese refugees brought to New Zealand from war zones by relatives in the Dominion has reached Auckland. The party comprises the wives of eight Chinese residents in New Zealand and several children. A larger party of 70 will reach Wellington shortly, and others are on the way.

Subject to certain conditions, wives of New Zealand-born Chinese are admitted to the country in ordinary times. The present arrivals have been brought to the Dominion by Chinese resident here but not born in New Zealand, under special permits. The refugees will be admitted for a period of two years, subject to the signing of a £500 bond and payment of a deposit of £200, to be forfeited if the conditions laid down are broken. Any children born to refugee wives while in New Zealand must leave at the expiry of the two-year term.

All the refugees in the group which has arrived are from Kwang Tung Province, the majority from the vicinity of Canton.

Many endured great hardship in reaching Hong Kong, whence they embarked for New Zealand via Australia. The journey from Canton to Kowloon, whence the ferry to Hong Kong leaves, normally takes about three hours by train. The refugees, however, had to travel on foot with their children and had to make a wide detour to avoid Japanese forces. Many took 10 days to reach Hong Kong. Even then difficulty was found in securing steamer accommodation, as all vessels leaving Hong Kong are crowded.

Several of the party on reaching New Zealand

still showed signs of the privations they had suffered. Only two families will remain in Auckland; the others will go to relatives in various parts of the North Island. (Evening Post, Volume CXXVIII, Issue 57, 5 September 1939, Page 16 - published on the arrival of Niagara Sydney to Auckland)

"Large Party's Arrival.

The second group of Chinese Refugees brought to Auckland by relatives in New Zealand, has arrived here. The party, comprising 30 Chinese, is one of the largest to have land at Auckland in recent years and is composed of 10 families. Twenty of the group are women, 13 of whom are married.

On arrival the families were greeted by the secretary of the Auckland Chinese Association, Mr Andrew Chong, who has been a leading figure in the move to allow his fellow-countrymen to bring their wives and young children from war zones in China into New Zealand. All the refugees were from the Canton area in South China. The members of the party appeared cheerful and showed no signs of the privation which attended their departure from China shortly before the fall of Canton.

The refugees have been admitted for two years, subject to the signing of a 500 pound bond and the payment of a deposit of 200 pound, to be forfeited if conditions laid down are broken." (NZ Herald 11 October 1939: arrival of Westralia Sydney to Auckland)

We know that her term of office will be rewarding for all. A special thanks to all who have kindly put up their hand to assist.

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Youth Leadership Camp [YLC]

"Over the weekend of 9-11 December over 40 young teenagers (aged between 14-17) from our NZ Chinese community branches attended the inaugural NZCA Auckland Youth Leadership Camp (YLC). The YLC evolved from a great deal of planning over 9 months but also taking on board a vision that past NZCA President Kai Luey had seen with a similar Rotary initiative - to ensure our youth stay connected with their community and culture. The teenagers came from across the branches - Foxton, Levin, Palmerston North, Waikato (5), Wellington (2) and even a keen young man from the Gold Coast. At least six campers were born outside of NZ including China and Malaysia, United Kingdom which was a great breakthrough - to widen our reach beyond the local born Chinese.



The organising committee worked well to pull together a comprehensive program involving high profile guest speakers (including Mayor of Gisborne Meng Foon, film director Roseanne Liang, and Global Marketing Manager Les Mills - Andrew Young), intensive physical outdoor activities and cultural insights with traditional Chinese dance and calligraphy. The core program was facilitated by Albert King who profiled the concepts of motivation, leadership and teamwork. Albert who is an inspiration and corporate consultant in Singapore had a real



connect with the campers and ensured they all came out of their comfort zone to step up, speak out and form new friendships and bonds. The program was intensive and the feedback was the participants wanted another day.



The physical activities proved popular with many participants overcoming their a fear of



heights and swinging from the trapeze pole, clambering up the cargo net or throwing themselves off the 25 foot pole. Following all the activities the campers were rewarded with some great catering by the supporters headed up by Connie Kum (and on Saturday night the kids were treated to ham off the bone).

The YLC sets the platform going forward for the younger college generation to stay in touch with what NZCA offers in terms of community spirit, culture and engagement.

This initiative is a stepping stone to the Leadership Development Conference, Winter Camp and FutureDragonz. We are in a good space now to offer a full coverage of initiatives from college, tertiary to post graduate and we hope that these young people take roles and responsibilities in NZCA to make it a stronger organisation. The next YLC is planned for 2013 and we will definitely hope our South Island cousins can come along as well.

The Cantonese Language is our heritage – as it is for those that have come from the Guangdong province of China or Hong Kong. Many have since learned Mandarin at school and then become fluent in both Mandarin and Cantonese.

NZCA Auck. gives you the opportunity to take your child to a school where the focus on learning is “The Fun Way”. The Music School focuses on oral language /conversation, role play, recognition and writing of simple characters. It is a fact that the best time for learning languages and music is between the ages of three to seven. It is amazing how quickly the preschoolers learn and absorb through play and music and movement. Parents can then continue this learning process by reinforcement at home and through the use of CDs.

Our very enthusiastic teachers; Mr Tat Tsui is an ex teacher who has taught for a number of years in Hong Kong and wife Ms Irene Ho has a degree in Counselling. She is very gentle with the children and is very successful in building up their confidence and self-esteem in their ability to learn the Cantonese language. Both are very passionate that Cantonese children should know their heritage language.

Term One 2012 will include Chinese Dancing classes for girls from five (or near five) to ten years old. NZCA annual Easter Tournament is held in Auckland this year and always after the Opening Ceremony there is a Cultural Concert. There will be two dance items (or a blend)– primary age and adults. Dance classes will start on the 18th February at Oranga Primary School Hall at 11 am – provisional.

We are very fortunate to have the services of Lin Zhuo – a very qualified teacher of Chinese dancing . Lin did the dance choreography and danced at the Cultural Concert at the Dunedin Sports Tournament. She also has done the same at the Youth Leadership Camp last December and instructed at the LDC earlier this year. We are truly indebted to Lin for her willingness to help and serve our NZCA Auckland community.

Working with Lin is Monica Mu (NZCA Ak Branch’s secretary) a dance enthusiast who started as a ‘babe’. Has had no formal training but was in the winning team at the Viva Eclectika Inter-cultural dance competition. She also danced her way into theatre and performed in the “Bone Feeder” and helped out with dance choreography and instructed at the YLC in December 2011. In her ‘spare’ time she enjoys Zhumplus Fitness dance group and the team recently performed at the Northcote Chinese and Korean New Year Festival.
